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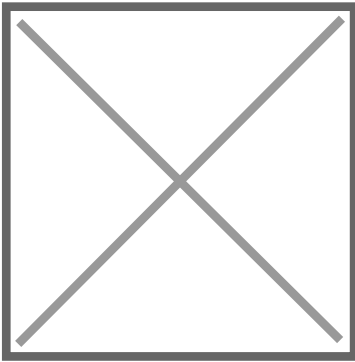

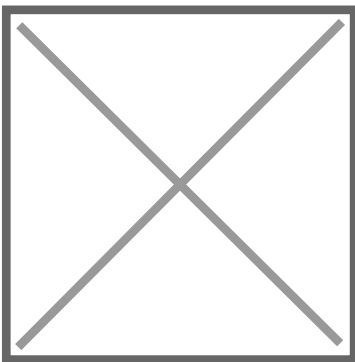


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Source Description:

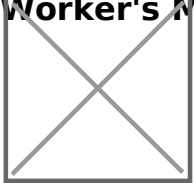

The black printing of birds on this early Worcester mug is of a type known as "smoky primitive" due to its somewhat uncertain character. Printing of this class represents the earliest to be found on Worcester porcelain. It has been suggested that at least some of this class of printing may have been carried out in Birmingham, rather than at the Worcester factory. Some examples are enhanced with *expand* [+]
